Christmas is Coming!

Yes, it is. Some are quick—too quick?—to herald this. A neighbor with Christmas lights displayed in early November. Starbucks greeting me with "Happy Holidays" on November 10th ("Huh?" I said, usually aware of the calendar, "Did I miss something?") Well, I pray that even as we enjoy the customs of Christmas, we will know that what we are dealing with is the "unfathomable miraculous reality" of Jesus Christ, God's incarnation in the person of his Son. And this reality is "so that the world might be saved through him" (John 3:17). In his merciful love, God seeks us.

Advent: A New Kind of Aliveness!

We use the season before Christmas, ideally, so that our perception of this miraculous work of salvation may be clearer. We "cast off works of darkness" and pray at the same time for God's "bountiful grace" to set us free. Throughout Advent we acknowledge our need of help, God's help. Calling for help is not a weak way of living, it's a way of being enlivened! It's asking to be infused with a new kind of vitality—not the vitality that comes by vowing to try harder—but the vitality that comes through repentance and trust in a reality eternal and sure. There is a "new kind of aliveness" that can be ours. We just have to ask. (John Webster, Christ our Salvation, page 2)

And We Give!

Motivated by the love of God for us and for all people, and responding to human need, we give joyfully for the sake of others. We promote giving to the *Christmas Fund, Nan's Giving Tree*, and the *Access Homeless Shelter*, among other good causes. And this cheers me. But I'm equally thrilled with the cascade of giving and blessing that flow person to person in this season. Good wishes. Smiles. Hugs. Helping Hands. Looking out for others. Renewal. Repentance. Refocusing. Rejoicing. Trusting. Believing. Amending our patterns of life. These things can, and should, and do happen throughout the year. The church calendar is just one way to structure our focus individually and together. 
DECEMBER ADULT FORUM

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AUTUMN PILGRIMAGE

How Living Waters Pilgrimage Changed Lives

In mid-October, just as the fall colors were beginning to peak, a group of 40-plus pilgrims from St. Paul's, St. Hilary Church in Fairlawn, and several other Akron-area churches embarked on St. Paul's Living Waters Pilgrimage.

We left Akron in the rainy, pre-dawn hours and headed north to Niagara Falls to witness the drama of the Holy Spirit's work in creation. En route pilgrims heard teachings on the Spirit's work in the beginning of creation, to His empowering people to do God's work throughout the Old Testament, and in the New Testament as He invited people to quench their thirst with living water.

Just for fun, and a sweet taste of heaven, we toured Platter's Chocolate Factory in North Tonawanda, NY, before heading on to Our Lady of Victory National Shrine and Basilica in Lackawanna, NY. We were blessed by attending noonday mass followed by Rev. Susan Tiffany's teaching on the work of the Holy Spirit during Mary's visit to her cousin Elizabeth and Zechariah (Luke 1.39-56).

As we traveled from each site on our itinerary, we heard teachings on who the Holy Spirit is, how to listen and recognize His voice, and how to act on what He says.

When we arrived at an overlook above the falls on the Youghiogheny River in Ohiopyle, PA, we were treated to a reflection on baptism and renewed our baptismal vows.

From there we moved on to Latrobe, PA, for a healing service where we prayed with one another in the crypt of St. Vincent Archabbey, followed by a tour of the basilica. Our visit there concluded with a presentation by Fr. Patrick Cronauer, professor of Sacred Scripture and Biblical Languages at St. Vincent Seminary, on the Holy Spirit throughout the Old and New Testaments, and his own personal testimony when he was a young man of a powerful encounter with the Spirit.

Our last day began with a tour of the Frank Lloyd Wrightdesigned home Falling Water, before heading to Pittsburgh and a visit at Shepherd's Heart Fellowship, an Anglican ministry to the homeless with special care for homeless veterans. Our host Scott Means gave a history of the ministry and how the Spirit provides for its needs so they can supply the needs of many people who have so little.

We began our days together in song and Morning Prayer on the bus and ended with more song and Compline in the lobbies of the hotels where we stayed.

Heading back to Akron from Pittsburgh the pilgrims shared testimonies of the many ways they encountered the Holy Spirit on the pilgrimage. Here are some of their thoughts.

"Living Waters [was] so powerful for me. The hymns and readings gave me deeper food for thought."

"The prayers and reflections really showed me the power of the Holy Spirit."

"I have taken many trips in my life ... and yes, they were great. But this pilgrimage brought me closer to God and it was awesome to pray and sing throughout the day and evening. All of my senses were stimulated, but my heart was joyful with the joy of Christ and the beauty of the water and the scenery."

"The Holy Spirit has touched me so deeply."

All the pilgrims send our heartfelt thanks to the people of St. Paul's, St. Hilary and other prayer partners who covered us in prayer while we were away. Thanks be to God for your faithfulness.

Join us for "good night" prayers. The Church calls this an Order for Compline, a time of quieting our hearts together in prayer as the day comes to an end.



Christmas Fund

St. Paul's members have been very generous to our Christmas Fund over the years. All Chirstmas Fund money goes directly to help people in need outside of St. Paul's. As of October 2024, our volunteers have met face-to-face with 34 households: serving 37 adults and 37 children. So far, we have given out \$25,009.47 in assistance. Most importantly, we listened and gave counsel, following Jesus' example and command. This is a very important way that St. Paul's extends its reach into the community. Habitat Update

A new ranch-style house now stands at 576 Evans Ave. in Akron, thanks in part to St. Paul's Habitat volunteers and funded in part through St. Paul's Easter Fund. This house is one of the first homes completed in Silver Maple Ridge of North Hill, a 16-home community which is being developed by Habitat for Humanity of Summit County.

Since May 2024, faithful members of St. Paul's have contributed their time and talents in partnership with Habitat for Humanity of Summit County and the Donnie Freeman/Cierra Williams family. Donnie and Cierra have three young children – LaDale, Lynell, and Janai. The family has been qualified by Habitat for Humanity of Summit County for a 30-year, interest-free mortgage for their house. In addition, each has completed a requirement of 250 sweat equity hours including 100+build hours.

St. Paul's built this house in collaboration with the Common Mission Coalition, a group of nine area congregations whose mission is to collaboratively proclaim and live the Kingdom of God in the community. This Habitat Home is the thirteenth house since 2000 that St. Paul's has sponsored. The house will be dedicated in November.



The Advent Wreath is a circular garland of evergreen branches that represent life everlasting. The circle of the wreath has no beginning and no end.





and one pink. Each week we will light an additional candle until all four candles are lit.

The first Sunday of Advent we light the first purple candle. It is typically called the "Prophecy Candle." With this candle we remember the prophets, primarily Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. This candle represents hope or expectation of the coming Messiah.

The second Sunday of Advent we light the second purple candle. This candle sometimes is called the "Bethlehem Candle," symbolizing Christ's manger. This candle represents love.

On the third Sunday of Advent we light the pink candle or the "Shepherd's Candle." This candle represents joy.

On the fourth Sunday of Advent we light the last purple candle, the "Angel's Candle." This candle represents peace.

FROM THE TREASURER

Operating Budget Results

Summarized here are the St. Paul's operating budget results for the calendar year to date:

The year-to-date as of 10/31/2024 continued in our pattern of monthly deficits, too large to be offset by the quarterly endowment distribution and investment income. Pledge income, however, was surprisingly over budget – thanks to those who have diligently kept up their pledges. Increased prices led to rising expenses overall, contributing to a net deficit, which was notably less than budgeted – again, in part to pledge income.


