Baptized Imaginations

We think of baptism as a sacramental rite, which it is. We can and should also think of the baptism of our minds---how we think—and our imaginations—how we see things. Baptism of our bodies takes a short time, baptism of the whole person, especially the understanding and imagination is a lifelong task of 'being renewed by the transformation of our minds' (Romans 12:2). Such transformation of the mind occurs when, for instance, we don't just say "all things come of thee, O Lord" because it's an ideal or the party-line, but because we really have come to see that all our gifts and blessings and talents and opportunities are from God. Our imagination, in this example has been baptized or converted.

Tuesday Evenings

The Rev. David Scavuzzo writes about the importance of the imagination: 'Imagination is a gift of God to the human mind and soul, which helps us to see *through* the creation of literature to deeper realities or to see the world as it is. Imagination plays an essential role in reading and "knowing" what is really intended. A good writer or speaker stimulates our imaginations—sensory details of seeing, hearing, feeling and smelling awaken the mind and heart.'Immersing ourselves in Scripture and good literature is a baptism worth undergoing. Dave, so gracious

with his time, is leading monthly explorations in *The Chronicles of Narnia* and scriptures related to them (read more about this on page 2), all as a joyful baptism in living our lives before the face of God.

Sunday Mornings: Keeping Evangelism in Front of Us (Again) In the Adult Forum



By the time you read this, we will have launched the Adult Forum already, summarizing the content of the book *Models of Evangelism*, but it's never too late to join! In this area, one transformation we might hope to undergo is to see the world not just in its conflicts and its secularism, but also, more and more, in its opportunities, to see the world even as a field, as Jesus said, 'ready and ripe for harvest' (John 4:35). That's a vision worth working for.

Peeler is a professor of New Testament at Wheaton College (Illinois) where her academic research focuses on the letter to the Hebrews, and how the Old Testament influenced the development of the New Testament. She is the author of Women and the Gender of God, "You Are My Son": The Family of God in the Epistle to the Hebrews, and the recently released Hebrews: Commentaries for Christian Formation. Last month Peeler spoke at The Living Church and All Souls' Anglican Foundation conference, "The Human Pilgrimage," about how we live fully as creatures created, loved, limited, and liberated by God. Wessner Chair of Biblical Studies at Wheaton where her academic research focuses on the New Testament especially the letter to the Hebrews, the influence of the Old Testament on the New Testament, St. Paul and gender, and the Gospel of Mark. She is the author of *Women and the Gender of God*, and the recently released *Hebrews: Commentaries for Christian Formation*. She is also a regular contributor to *Christianity Today* magazine. 
In the Garden – A Word from the Memorial Garden Committee

Did you know that St. Paul's Memorial Garden has been a lovely, serene space on our church property for over 40 years? The Garden was dedicated on All Saints' Day, Nov. 7th, 1993 with a service that included the following prayer:

The blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, be ever upon this place.

Sanctify and keep it holy, that it may be a fit resting place for the remains of his Saints.

The Garden was designed by local landscape architect John Vittum with a detailed planting scheme. Although there have been updates over the years, the basic design remains as envisioned by Mr. Vittum and the original Memorial Garden committee. It was their hope that the Garden would often be visited by members of St. Paul's, and others, alone or in groups, to pray, to meditate, and to remember loved ones. That remains our hope today.



Members of St. Paul's and their families are eligible to be interred here through purchase of an Interment agreement. The Garden's beauty, convenience and affordability plus the assurance of perpetual care make it an attractive choice for members of the St. Paul's family who are interested in cremation. FROM THE TREASURER

Operating Budget Results

Summarized here are the St. Paul's operating budget results for the calendar year to date.

The year-to-date as of 8/31/2024 ended with below budget contribution revenue, which was partially offset by receipt of the quarterly endowment distribution and investment income. Expenses were higher than expected overall, the largest in the areas of maintenance, grounds, and utilities – all of which contributed to a net deficit greater than budgeted.
